HOLY FATHERS OF THE SEVENTH ECUMENICAL COUNCIL 4TH SUNDAY OF LUKE

HIEROMARTYR JACOB OF HAMATOURA

INNOCENT, APOSTLE TO THE AMERICAS • VENERABLE KENDEAS OF CYPRUS VENERABLE-MARTYR MAKARIOS OF ST. ANNE SKETE ON ATHOS

The Hieromartyr (priest-martyr) Jacob was a 13th century monk in the Northern Lebanese Monastery of the Dormition of the Theotokos in Hamatoura. He is a recently rediscovered saint and is revered greatly in Lebanon.

Saint Jacob began his ascetic life in the late 13th century. He rebuilt the monastery, regenerating and monastic life in the area. His spiritual vivacity, and popularity among believers drew the attention of the Mamelukes who set their minds to stop his determination and force him to convert to Islam. He refused their relentless pressures.

They dragged Jacob, along with a number of monks and laymen, from Saint George's Monastery, atop Mount Hamatoura, to Tripoli. For almost a year, he endured tremendous tortures. Nevertheless, he did not give in or renounce his faith despite receiving both adulations and threats. Finally, on October 13, Saint Jacob was beheaded and his body burned.

Our Lord bestowed on him everlasting crowns. Today

he shines as a martyr even more than during his earthly life with apparitions and healings.

Order for Holy Communion

Members of the Orthodox Church age seven and above must prepare for Holy Communion with a recent confession, prayer, fasting from all food and drink from midnight (unless medical condition preclude it), being in church before the Epistle and Gospel readings, and being at peace with everyone.

CHILDREN going to church school and their teachers should come down the center aisle first. (Small children may need to be assisted by their parents.)

ALL OTHERS should wait until an usher dismisses your row from the center aisle. Then return to your place by a side aisle for the prayers of thanksgiving and the final blessing and dismissal. Please let choir members pass when they come down for Communion.

A Warm Welcome to Our Guests

We are glad you are worshipping with us. Please note that participation in Holy Communion is limited to members of the Orthodox Church in good standing, who have prepared through prayer, fasting and confession.

For all others: though we cannot share Communion with you—since it is an expression of membership and full unity in faith—you are welcome to come forward after the dismissal, receive a blessing and partake of the blessed bread (from the large bowls). Please also sign our guest book, and introduce yourself to Fr. Nabil during the coffee hour. You may inquire with him how you can become a member.

Troparion for the Holy Fathers (Tone 8)

You are most glorious, O Christ our God! You have established the Holy Fathers as lights on the earth! Through them you have guided

us to the true faith! O greatly Compassionate One, glory to You!

Troparion for St. Jacob of Hamatoura (Tone 3)

As a cedar of Lebanon thou growest, never fearing thy death by martyrdom, thou becamest a true victor, O Saint Jacob, for thou didst overcome death with thy mortal flesh, when thou didst tame all the passions by humility. And while burning like incense, as a true sacrifice, thou intercedest with Christ to grant our souls the great mercy.

Troparion for St. George (Tone 4, Russian)

As Deliverer of captives and Defender of the poor, Healer of the infirm, Champion of kings, victorious Great-Martyr George,

intercede with Christ, our God, for our souls' salvation.

Kontakion of the Theotokos (Tone 2)

O undisputed intercessor of Christians, the Mediatrix who is unrejected by the Creator. Turn not away from the voice of our petitions, though we be sinners. Come to us with aid in time, who cry unto thee in faith, for thou art good. Hasten to us with intercessions, O Theotokos, who dost ever intercede for those who honor thee.

SCRIPTURE LESSONS

Prokeimenon (Daniel 3:26, 27; Tone 4)

Blessed are You, O Lord, the God of our Fathers. *Verse:* For You are just in all You have done.

Reading from the Epistle of St. Paul to Titus (3:8-15; Holy Fathers)

TITUS, MY SON, the saying is sure. I desire you to insist on these things, so that those who have believed in God may be careful to apply themselves to good deeds; these are excellent and profitable to men. But avoid stupid controversies, genealogies, dissensions, and quarrels over the law, for they are

unprofitable and futile. As for a man who is factious, after admonishing him once or twice, have nothing more to do with him, knowing that such a person is perverted and sinful; he is self-condemned.

When I send Artemas or Tychicos to you, do your best to come to me at Nicopolis, for I

have decided to spend the winter there. Do your best to speed Zenas the lawyer and Apollos on their way; see that they lack nothing. And let our people learn to apply themselves to good deeds, so as to help cases of urgent need, and not to be unfruitful. All who are with me send greetings to you. Greet those who love us in the faith. Grace be with you all. Amen.

Reading of the Holy Gospel according to St. Luke (8.5-15; 4th Sunday of Luke)

THE LORD SPOKE THIS PARABLE: "A sower went out to sow his seed; and as he sowed, some fell along the path, and was trodden under foot, and the birds of the air devoured it. And some fell on the rock; and as it grew up, it withered away, because it had no moisture. And some fell among thorns; and the thorns grew with it and choked it. And some fell into good soil and grew, and yielded a hundredfold."

And when his disciples asked Him what this parable meant, Jesus said, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of God; but for others they are in parables, so that seeing they may not see, and hearing they may not understand. Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God.

The ones along the path are those who have heard; then the devil comes and takes away the word from their hearts, that they may not believe and be saved. And the ones on the rock are those who, when they hear the word, receive it with joy; but these have no root, they believe for a while and in time of temptation fall away. As for what fell among the thorns, they are those who hear, but as they go on their way they are choked by the cares and riches and pleasures of life, and their fruit does not mature. And as for that in the good soil, they are those who, hearing the word, hold it fast in an honest and good heart, and bring forth fruit with patience." As Jesus said this, He called out, "He who has ears to hear, let him hear."


